Course Requirements/Grading System: Describe any course specific requirements such as research papers or reading assignments and the generalized grading format for the course.

Two Papers: 40% (20% each)

Applying the concepts of Aristotle, Thomas, and Ball to two of the plays read during the semester.

Present dramaturgical information on one play for the class (10-15 minutes) that engages the class.

Final project: 25%

This project can take many forms. It can be an original adaptation of a text from the theatrical "canon," a dramaturgical notebook, a research paper, or a research project in set design (among others).

Class participation: 20%

In addition to actively discussing the plays, each week posts will be made as written responses to the play or readings for that week on Brightspace.
