Additional Course Information

Topical Outline: Each offering of this course must include the following topics (be sure to include information regarding lab, practicum, and clinical or other non-lecture instruction).

1. Play all twelve major scales, two octaves, hands separately or together.
2. Play all twelve natural and harmonic minor scales, two octaves, hands separately or together.
3. Play all twelve major and minor cadences, I IV V V7 I in root position, hands together.
4. Play all twelve major and minor arpeggios in root position, hands separately or together.
5. Demonstrate rhythmic acumen by counting simple and compound exercises to the subdivision.
6. Harmonize simple melodies using tonic, subdominant, dominant chords in major and minor keys.
7. Sight read simple selections with melody and chords, hands together.
8. Transpose elementary musical selections with both hands playing to various keys.
9. Complete 4-6 repertoire pieces of differing styles.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Learning Outcomes – Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. The student will master theoretical structures including major scales and two forms of the minor scales (natural and harmonic), cadences and arpeggios in root position on the piano.
2. The student will master assigned rhythmic studies.
3. The student will develop improving sight-reading skills.
4. The student will successfully perform at least one late intermediate piano solos from each style period: the Baroque, Classical, Romantic and 20th Century piano literature.

Methods of Assessment:

1. The student will perform assigned major scale for the instructor in each weekly lesson.
2. The student will perform major and minor scales during the final examination (jury).
3. The student will perform 3 forms of the major and/or minor scales for the instructor in the weekly lesson.
4. The student will perform rhythm studies during the final examination (jury) in simple and compound time.
5. The student will be sight-reading at each lesson, and will be assigned sight-reading throughout the week.
6. The student will perform one late intermediate to early advanced level solo for the instructor and one for a jury.

Required text(s), optional text(s) and/or materials to be supplied by the student:

Students will purchase this book (during MUAP 1270) that will continue to be used for all four semesters of piano: Palmer, Manus, Lethco; "Intermediate Musicianship;" Alfred Publishing

Students must be prepared to demonstrate increased skills in assigned materials and will receive a weekly grade accordingly. They must perform a recital or a jury by playing one selection from repertoire assigned during the semester. The student must also present an hourly practice time schedule each week and have practiced a minimum of 9 hours per week. The final grade will be assessed from the weekly grades, jury and practice times throughout the semester.
